





MY DAY SKIPPER EXPERIENCE

For those who may not know, the RYA Day Skipper qualification is an entry-level certification for recreational sailors, enabling them to skipper a yacht in familiar waters during daylight hours. It's a practical course focused on developing boat handling, navigation, and seamanship skills.

In this article, Ginny tells us all about her experience. PSC has over 20 Day Skippers - will you be next?!

Back in 2020, I completed my RYA Competent Crew course — five days of hands-on sailing in the Solent that gave me my first ever taste of life on a cruising yacht. It was a great introduction to the basics of crewing, sail handling and working as part of a team on board.

Since then, most of my yacht sailing experience has come through club trips in Croatia with other PSC members. The trips gave me the chance learn from more experienced skippers and crew mates and start to understand how everything fits together on a yacht. After a few seasons of sun, sea, and shared learning, my interest was piqued and combined with a bit of peer pressure, I felt motivated to take the next step: RYA Day Skipper.

For anyone considering the same, I'm sharing a bit about the process. It's a combination of theory and practical training which has taken time and commitment. I'm proud to have done it and it's been a rewarding milestone in my sailing so far.

I started with the theory course which I did online with Ardent Training. The syllabus is wide ranging and it's fair to say that some chapters were easier to get through than others! The flexibility of online learning with Ardent was great – and with other PSC members doing the same course there was always support and encouragement.

With the theory complete, the next step is the five-day practical course which I did with Solent Boat Training (SBT). Emma Stopford and Dan Perry were doing their Day Skipper practical with SBT the same month — we had hoped to do it together but due to the volume of learning only two Day Skipper students are allowed per boat.

My employment status (retired!) and the number of courses offered by SBT meant I was able to reschedule. It is also worth knowing that SBT offer the theory course as a 5 day face to face course if that style of learning suits better.



The RYA also recommends the Level 2
Dinghy course to make sure your sailing skills are up to speed before doing the day skipper course. I pushed myself to do as many Sunday morning dinghy races as possible. I found it challenging to be consistent in January and February but was glad I had made the effort and it helped my confidence a lot ahead of the day.



REQUIRED EXPERIENCE

Basic sailing ability. 5 days, 100 miles and 4 night hours onboard a sailing yacht. Navigation and theory to Dayskipper Shorebased level.

Minimum duration: 5 days

Content: Preparation for sea, deck work, navigation, pilotage, meteorology, rules of the road, maintenance and repair work, engines, victualing, emergency situations, yacht handling under power and sail, passage making and night cruising.

The practical course brought the learning to life. There were five of us on the boat – our trainer, another day skipper and two competent crew. The yacht, Hope, was a Bavaria 37. We took turns skippering passages, practiced mooring and anchoring, sail trim, man overboard, pilotage into unfamiliar harbours and night sailing and worked through the extensive syllabus.

Being handed responsibility as skipper — having to plan a passage, brief the crew clearly, and take charge of the boat — was a real learning experience. For me, it was a bit nerve wracking, but our trainer was great and emphasised that the objective was to learn how to do things not to demonstrate we could already do them. All the same, there was a huge sense of relief along with achievement when he confirmed I'd passed and wrote out my license.



Since qualifying, I've chartered a yacht in Croatia, skippering for the first time with a crew of experienced PSC friends — all Day Skippers with far more sea miles and experience than me. Their support, encouragement and feedback was very much appreciated.

I'd absolutely recommend the Day Skipper course. It has improved my skills and understanding of what's happening on board and increased my confidence no end! It has also given me the bug to go on to the next level of theory and I've not ruled out further practical courses either. (I've done a marina skills / boat handling day since.) As I'm writing this I'm also reminded that I had a thoroughly enjoyable week of sailing and got loads of knowledge from our trainer, other crew members and the trainer and crew aboard Ecos who were doing the day skipper / competent crew course alongside us.

If you're thinking about it and want to know more, feel free to grab me — or Emma or Dan — for a chat next time you see us at the club.

USEFUL TIP!

An International Certificate of Competence (ICC), issued by the RYA based on your Day Skipper qualification is needed to charter abroad — no further exams required. Just remember it can take some time to arrive.



What has become an annual trip to Croatia took place during the first two weeks of June this year. I had the fun and responsibility of skippering one of the three boats in the second week of the informal flotilla, with Vicky in charge of another and Admiral Tim on the Flagship for two weeks. (A promotion from Commodore, reflecting a fleet of yachts on the high seas!).

The first challenge was preparing the provisioning list to cater for all diets, tastes, and appropriate quantities. Amazingly, when the many crews arrived from several airports in the UK and Europe, and Dave and Ginny by campervan, everyone arrived on schedule, shopping was completed and the three boats were able to leave the hot marina by Saturday evening to find a cooler and sheltered anchorage across the main channel.





The weather was kind all week, with pleasant breezes almost the entire time with one stormy afternoon and brisker winds on some days. We could therefore put our sailing skills to good use, with some particularly determined crews - Admiral Tim urged his crew into racing position...

Meanwhile, a visitor placed on our yacht was happy to stay for a few days, which we took as a good sign given the reputation of rats and sinking ships...











On Friday, Admiral Tim's big birthday dawned, with a good breeze for our last day of sailing. But what happened to the flagship here – a celebratory dance?

OWEN WILL SOON BE SETTING SAIL...



Having enjoyed two fantastic sailing holidays in Croatia I decided that I would like to do a Yacht Charter in different waters this year. So with Steve Dyson to skipper Kevin Guard myself and two sailing friends Ivi and Besa flew to the beautiful island of Kefalonia to collect Eleni (recent PSC member, sailing instructor and Sunday racer who now lives back in Argostoli) and set sail for a week on board the yacht Planis.

We were able to sail every day with very little motoring and on the quiet times when the wind dropped we swam or were pulled gently along in the truly blue clear water. Marina fees were cheap averaging 16 euros and the food was delicious (we did a mixture of eating on board and eating out). Day one we sailed from Port Sami around the headland to overnight at anchor in Antisamos Bay. From there we sailed to Vathy Port on one of my favourite Greek Islands Ithaca. Ithaca is said to be home to the mythological King Odysseus and in Vathy there is a famous and beautiful statue so of course we had to take photos.





The next day as luck would have it I found myself moored up in the harbour at Vaseliki the windsurfers paradise on the island of Lefkada. Even better, the whole crew were happy to hang around while Eleni and I hired kit and had a go ourselves. From Vaseliki we headed to the other side of Lefkada island and inadvertently moored up on a private marina in Drepano Bay (we thought the other boats looked large and posh) but as none of the owners were expected to return we got away with it.

The following day we had to meet a deadline to be in time to queue to go through the swingbridge at Lefkada Town. But the girl did great and we went on to have a beautiful dinner swim walks and more ice cream in this former fishing harbour.





Then our final sail back into Port Sami to return our yacht. Of course the inevitable discussions about fuel used and fuel charged for. Of course they tried to overcharge us. With Eleni on board this made all these discussions easier to resolve but we were a truly multinational team British Bulgarian Greek Irish and Kosovan.

SPOTLIGHT ON:



PRIORY WATER QUALITY

The quality of the water in the River Great Ouse is tested regularly by a small group of volunteer Citizen Scientists called Bedfordshire Great Ouse Valley Environmental Trust. Interestingly, there are no 'designated bathing spaces' anywhere on the entire length of the Great Ouse and so the Environment Agency do not test the water hence why volunteer organisations pick up this task.

The Trust has found that although the phosphate levels in most the of the river have been within an acceptable tolerance, the nitrates and the e-coli levels in the water have been far higher than then levels set for safe bathing.

For the last half year, we have been testing the water quality in Priory Lake and, most encouragingly, have found that the Priory water has very low levels of phosphates and nitrates and the e-coli levels are less than half that set for the level that is safe to capsize and fall into! This is fantastic news for the club.

The results are thought to be attributable to the fact that low volumes of river water feed our lake, combined with very high levels of UV light and shallow water. Rest assured that testing will continue.

WINDSURFING MENTORING SUMMER UPDATE



For several years, we've offered windsurfing mentoring sessions during the summer months, and this year has seen a noticeable increase in participation. Each Saturday morning, more than ten members regularly join us for the three-hour sessions, making it one of our most vibrant activities.

As one of the member instructors, I've found these sessions incredibly rewarding. It's been a joy to watch participants improve week by week. Rain or shine, our regulars show up whenever their weekend schedules allow, bringing with them a contagious enthusiasm that makes it a pleasure to spend Saturday mornings supporting their progress.





Sessions run from 10am to 1pm. We make sure that anyone who needs or requests instruction receives guidance onshore using the trainer before heading out onto the water. Beginners often start tethered to a buoy to build confidence and balance.







We also ensure everyone knows how to rig their sail and board properly, and how to carry it safely to and from the water. It's heartening to see members helping each other with this process. Some of our younger sailors return each year, and as they grow older, they're eager to support and encourage others.

Before anyone begins windsurfing, we check their sailing experience and understanding of wind direction and balance. That said, windsurfing is quite different from traditional sailing. The basics may seem simple—approach the board, place both hands on it, push up from the water, get your knees on the board, and stand. Then you reach for the uphaul to lift the rig (mast, sail, and boom) from the water. And just as you do, you lose balance and fall back in! Eventually, you manage to stand long enough to grasp the boom, and when the first breeze catches the sail, you're off—often gliding straight into the bank by the café or under the trees where ducks and geese gather.

Windsurfing—perhaps more than sailing—demands a healthy attitude toward failure. Even the quickest learners find themselves falling in again and again. It takes real determination to keep climbing back onto the board after each spill. But gradually, the time between falls increases, and so does the time spent actually sailing. Before long, you're not just staying upright—you're steering, turning, and even making it back to the sailing area (most of the time!).

And as for getting wet? That's a given. This isn't like sailing. As we always say at the start: "It's a watersport. You are going to get wet!"


